

Life After Intercession: What You Need to Know

Experiencing spiritual intercession is powerful and life-changing. When God sets you free, chains break, burdens lift, and peace enters in. But freedom is not the end of the journey—it's the beginning of a new walk with Christ. It can be a form of Deliverance that sets you free.

Many people think this means the battle is over, but in reality, it shifts into a new phase. To remain free and walk in the fullness of what God has done, here are ten truths every believer must know.

1. Spiritual Warfare Will Still Be Real

this doesn't mean the enemy gives up. He often comes back to test if you will surrender ground again. You may feel old thoughts, temptations, or fears trying to creep in. Don't be discouraged—this doesn't mean your deliverance “didn't work.” It means you're in a war.

Scripture:

“Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Resist him, standing firm in the faith...” (1 Peter 5:8–9).

2. Passivity Is the Greatest Enemy

One of the biggest mistakes after deliverance is slipping into passivity. If you simply sit back, the enemy will try to reclaim what was cast out. You cannot live neutral in the spiritual life. Deliverance calls you into **active partnership with God**—choosing daily to resist the devil, renew your mind, and pursue the things of the Spirit.

Scripture:

“Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.” (James 4:7).

3. Stay in the Word Daily

God's Word is your greatest weapon. Without it, you are defenseless. Scripture renews your mind, exposes lies, strengthens your spirit, and gives you authority to speak truth when the enemy attacks.

Scripture:

"For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." (Hebrews 4:12).

4. Commit to Prayer

Prayer keeps your heart aligned with God and builds intimacy with Him. It's not just asking for things—it's about staying connected, being strengthened, and receiving guidance. Through prayer, you also **push back darkness**.

Scripture:

"Pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." (Ephesians 6:18).

5. Live a Life of Worship

Worship isn't just singing songs; it's exalting God above all else. Worship creates an atmosphere where the enemy cannot thrive. It shifts your focus from fear to faith, from self to God, and from defeat to victory.

Scripture:

"God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth." (John 4:24).

6. It's Part of Your Sanctification

This is not the finish line —it's the **starting point of sanctification**. Sanctification is the lifelong process of becoming more like Christ, growing in holiness, and learning to walk by the Spirit.

Scripture:

“Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God’s will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.” (Romans 12:2).

7. Put On the Full Armor of God

Ephesians 6:10–18 tells us to put on the full armor of God daily so we can stand against the enemy’s schemes. Life after deliverance isn’t lived carelessly—it’s lived **clothed in Christ’s power**.

Standing is vital. No matter what comes—temptation, pressure, fear, or attack—you stand firm in faith and refuse to give ground.

Scripture:

“Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand.” (Ephesians 6:13).

8. If You’re Afraid of Satan

Fear is one of the enemy’s favorite weapons, but it doesn’t come from God. You don’t have to bow to it.

Scripture:

“For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind.” (2 Timothy 1:7).

Prayer Against Fear and the Enemy:

In the name of Jesus Christ, and by the authority given to me in Luke 10:18–19, I command you to get out of my life, get out of my home, get out of my mind, and get out of everything around me. In Jesus’ name, be gone. For greater is He who is in me than he who is in the world. God has not given me a spirit of fear, but of love, power, and a sound mind. I put on that love, power, and sound mind right now, in Jesus’ name. I command you to go now and not come back. Amen.

9. Faith Is the Victory

Faith is the very heart of your walk with God. Everything you face after deliverance—spiritual warfare, trials, temptations, and testing—will be used to strengthen your faith.

Scripture:

“For everyone born of God overcomes the world. This is the victory that has overcome the world, even our faith.” (1 John 5:4).

As your faith grows, you’ll be more confident in Christ and more convinced that you do not have to bow to the devil’s garbage. **Faith is what allows you to stand, resist, and walk in victory.**

10. Spiritual Warfare Will Always Be Part of the Christian Life

Spiritual warfare is not a passing season—it’s part of the Christian walk and always will be. It never goes away. But this is not bad news. The sooner you learn to fight, the sooner you will overcome. God has equipped you with His Spirit, His Word, His armor, and His authority to stand in victory every single day.

Scripture:

“Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil’s schemes.” (Ephesians 6:10–11).

It’s not just about what you’ve been freed from —it’s about what you’re being freed for. God wants you to live in sustained victory, growing in strength, intimacy, and maturity in Christ.

Stay alert. Stay active. Keep your armor on. And above all—**keep your eyes fixed on Jesus.** The freedom you’ve received is real, and it’s meant to last.
